

GER 297: Kleist Winter Quarter 2021


This course examines the life and works of
Heinrich von Kleist (1777-1811) against the
backdrop of revolutionary turmoil in Europe and
the Americas and the Napoleonic Wars. It also
situates Kleist with respect to German
Classicism and Romanticism and contemporary
philosophy, in particular, Kant and Fichte.



Kleist's texts are notorious for their unique style and great ideological pliability. In exploring Kleist's works, we will pay particular attention to conceptualizations of the body, language, and identity, the representation of race and gender, and concepts of war and terrorism.

Texts: Michael Kohlhaas, Penthesilea, Die Marquise von O, The Earthquake in Chili, Betrothal in St. Domingo, The Broken Jug, On the Gradual Production of Thoughts while Speaking, and others.

Class discussion will be in English. Texts are available in English and German.
